We are working with **North West Employers** and **four local councils** in Greater Manchester to test different ideas about roles for local elected members in their communities.

People's Republic of Energy

Transform GM is kickstarting a mapping exercise to show the diversity of social economy initiatives in Greater Manchester, with a focus on below-the-radar activities.



GM Decides

Working with **Amity**, this user-centred project looks at the scope for digital democratic innovations in Greater Manchester (GM), focusing on citizen engagement in policy initiation and design.

Young People Missing from Decisions

The Children's Society are supporting this youth-led design process with young people, to explore how they are missing from decisions that routinely affect their lives.



Co-producing the Green Summit

Through participation in the **Green Summit Steering Group**, this project seeks to widen citizen engagement in the development of the city-region's first Green Summit.

People's Procurement

Working with the **Centre for Local Economic Strategies** we are testing innovative new ways of exploring scenarios for Greater Manchester residents to have more say in how public money is spent.

The Care at Home Challenge

This project with **Shared Future CIC** is working with people who are directly involved in doing, or deciding about, care-at-home policy – exploring ways to bring emotional and practical considerations into decisions over healthcare delivery.



Space in Common

Running alongside the development of the Greater Manchester Spatial Framework, we are working with the **Democratic Society** to ask how we can have better conversations about spatial planning?
