Jam and Justice: Co-producing Urban Governance for Social Innovation

Participant Information

Jam and Justice: Co-Producing Urban Governance for Social Innovation is a research project using co-production to test and learn about mechanisms for citizen engagement in urban decision-making. We are funded by the Economic and Social Research Council's Urban Transformations programme, and the Realising Just Cities UK programme, part of the international Mistra Urban Futures Centre for Sustainable Cities. The Jam and Justice project started in January 2016 and will end in July 2019.

We will treat all those involved in the research with honesty and respect. We have secured institutional ethical approval to undertake this research. We adhere to sector-wide standards for ethical conduct in research and seek to avoid personal and psychological harm to individuals. The primary element of the ethical approval relates to informed consent and being clear about how data is collected, stored and managed. It also relates to issues of anonymity and confidentiality.

Data will be generated through a self-administered online questionnaires. This data will help us address our research questions. Data will be collected, stored, managed and archived in line with the Research Council UK's Common Principles on Data Policy and the ESRC Research Data Policy. Personal information about respondents will not be divulged to any third party without the consent of the participant concerned. De-identified data will be made freely available to the scientific community after completion of the project via the UK Data Service (<https://www.ukdataservice.ac.uk>) for future research and learning.

Where data is generated in the course of the research, principles of confidentiality and anonymity will be applied as appropriate. Participation is entirely voluntary and participants can withdraw from the Jam and Justice project at any time during the research project (end July 2019), including removal of consent for us to use any of your data up to that point. You have the right to request that anything you may regard as sensitive (verbal or written) be excluded from the study.

In addition to your participation in the main research activities, our researchers may wish to contact you to ask further questions and invite you to other related events. You can give or decline consent for either purpose and any contact details you provide will only be used for the agreed purpose(s).
